

The following men slated for induction in the July group will report to the selective service board Sunday, July 18, at 8:30 a.m. As has been usual with recent groups, they will go to the induction center at Fort Snelling. Married men going from the area are Henry Kelso and Wilfred Loosbrock from Wilmont and Linus Krogman from Lismore. The decrease of the number of single men available for service in indicated in the July list.

Pvt. Bernard Kuhl of Trinidad, Colorado is spending this week with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Kuhl.

Mr. and Mrs. Albert Molitor and Bradley of Worthington visited in the Matt Gerber and Barney Reilly homes Sunday. They were accompanied her by Donald Gerber, who had arrived there from Fort Snelling.

Raphael A. Menson Fl-c of Miami, Florida arrive here Thursday to spend his furlough at the home of his parents and other relatives. Mr. Menson also spend a short time at the Tribune office, giving his change of address and stand that he enjoyed the home paper very much. He will be going to Fort Bliss in Texas to be stationed there.

#### St. Kilian

Pvt. Conrad Diekmann, U. S. field artillery, and son of Mrs. Mary Diekmann, is believed to be the first wearer of the order of the Purple Heart to return to Nobles County from North Africa service. He was wounded in action on March 25, when a piece of shrapnel struck him in the upper arm, and is back on this side for work on scar tissue which hampers use of his arm. His furlough is the first in the 14 months since he was inducted at Fort Snelling in the spring of 1942. He was shipped over seas in five months after entering the service.

In April of this year, 1943, it is \$85.03, but if the average American had been asked to pay April's war expenses on the spot, they would have taken \$53.52 of his new \$85.03 income.

Larry Balster Writes Interesting Letter From Africa: May 21, 1943 - Friend Pete: Well, Pete am still feeling fine and hope everybody in the old Burg is the same. Have been pretty busy since I left the U.S.A. last September. Want to thank you and the rest of the boys that make it possible for us to receive the hometown paper. Received the March 27 issue a few days ago. Think I've received six or seven issues since being in Africa.

Things out here are fine now that we don't have to sweat out Jerry, which was our job for the past six months. We are still around (censored) but shortly I hope to be in a position to send and receive mail more rapidly. Last nite we had a concert and show and also a showing of the movie "Cairo". Both were the first we had since we have been in Africa. Several nights before we had a song fest. Everybody joining in, but the principal actor was wine. All I can say for the stuff, it's either no good or us Americans don't know how much we are suppose to drink. Haven't had a beer for better than six months & is around 95 degrees. Boy a glass of "Dick's" beer would go good about now. Now that the battle is over, the censorship has been lifted to a great extent, will write and tell you of some of my experiences. I left the States September 4 on the Queen Mary and landed across September 11, had a 12 hour train ride to southern England and saw a lot of England at this time. Stayed there for a little better than a week and another train ride and boat ride to Ireland. Joined the 2 T.F.K. of the First Arm'd Division in Ireland. Stayed in Ireland for a few weeks and another boat ride back to England. Really enjoyed this ride for has been the only American boat I've been on so far and really had good show. Have never been sea sick but won't say I never will. The old pond gets pretty rough at times and really gets some of the boys. A few weeks in England and we started on the long 21-day voyage to Africa. All we seen for 19 days was birds, ships and water. Heard at one time we were awful close to the states and know darn well we weren't going in same direction all the time and must have been going in circles for the sun was on the wrong side of the boat some mornings. We had a good idea we were going to Africa after a few days out and were told after a week. The morning of the 20th day we could see land and went through the Straits that day and landed and heard some of Roosevelt speech that night. After three days of fighting against the French and Oran fell we went into an area for rehabilitation. After six days of cleaning ourselves, vehicles and going swimming in the Mediterranean Sea we got orders to move towards Tunisia. Axis troops had captured Tunis and Bizarre before us and our forward forces were believed not to be strong enough. We traveled overland and after five days we arrived at our bivouac area near Medjeyel base, about 30 miles from Tunis. Within in a few days we were in action against Jerry on the road to Tebourba. On the way up about all the planes we saw were Allied and we knew that we had air superiority. On the front however, owing chiefly to the distance of our airports it was quite otherwise. As we had landed with only a combat team of our division, that is all we had with us at the time. We had only about 1500 men and from what I hear the enemy outnumbered us in that sector by at least three to one. For six days we battled and by the full use of our mobility kept the enemy confused. We advanced almost up to Tebourba, about 15 miles from Unis, despite the constant bombing at will of our units by Stukas. Lucky for us that we had our fox holes plenty deep and would make good use of them

while the bombs dropped. On the seventh day Jerry wised up for he sent over his Stukas in waves follow by Mark Four Tanks. We had very little infantry ahead of us and no tanks. We had a battery of six 105 howitzers and after a few hours of pretty rugged fighting we had destroyed ten German Tanks, but they also destroyed our battery. Those of us who got away either drove thru fire over impassable country or else took off on boat across the nearby rive to the other side which was still in our hands. A few days later the remainder of our combat team was moved to the vicinity of Saukel Khenis (near Medjez) to guard against paratroops and for reorganization. It rained most of the 26 days we were there and had a very enjoyable Christmas. No mail, no packages and in mud up to our knees. The last six were spent in fox holes as Jerry sent his Stukas over to raid our area about 4 or 5 times a day. Our Ack Ack men were pretty accurate and brought some of the Stukas down and kept the rest too high to be effective. Our air field about 20 miles from theirs was a sea of mud and almost impossible for Spits to take off so Jerry had the air to himself. We finally moved across the mountain to a new area. By this time more American units had arrived. Our losses had been mostly made up and enough of the First Army to hold Medjezel Bab which as a result of our fight had remained as an allied base. We think quite a bit of the British boys in the first Army and they think quite a bit of us. At that time neither of our forces were very strong and we had to depend on each other. We got there in no time to save a British Regiment from being annihilated in November and they sure helped us when we needed it December 6th. We left some of the British about this time for we were assigned to the Central Tunisia sector with the French. We moved around the sector until the end of January when after a force march we moved in the Ossetia Valley and drove Jerry from the Pass. By this time the Second Corps had come up including the balance of our Division and we were attached as reserves. It was against men in their first battle that Rommels panzers and Stukas blasted away at, at the Feld Pass. Having Stukas and Mark Fours blasting at them was too much for the new men and they had to give ground. We made a force march from farther north and arrived in time to join the rest of the troops at Sbeilts. But the damage was done and another column of Jerry's were threatening our line to our supply base. Without much battle we fell back to protect our base (Tebassa in Algeria). When Jerry broke thru the Passerine Pass our combat team was sent to stop his advance towards Teresa. The British Six Armed were across th chill from us in another valley and between the two of us in four days we had Jerry heading for home. Jerry tried his old Stuka tank formation on us the last few days but didn't fair so well. The Stukas were no longer the terrors they used to be. The last day we saw the Stukas coming and got into our fox holes until they dropped their load and got out and really poured the artillery at Jerry. With the help of our Boston Bombers and Spits his tank formation was broken up and our tanks started to mop up. By evening Jerry started his retreat back to Faid Pass. Saw a lot of dead Jerries, prisoners and war supplies and picked up a lot of souvenirs. Had a few days rest here and we set off again on the road to Macknassy. After the town fell we moved into position so that we could prevent the main body which headed towards Gabes from being outflanked. Here we remained for 23 days. Protecting us were some tanks and one company of infantry. We let Jerry have plenty of lead and he let us have a little but we accomplished our mission. We stayed there a few days after Jerry pulled up north and followed him. Took us a day and a night's travel to get to the northern sector. The second Corps that went to fight

for Meteur, Ferryville and Bizarre were no longer the outfit that failed at Faid Pass when Jerry made his drive for Tebessa. We had enough troops to have depth and for the first time air supremacy when we attacked. While lead came our way our fox holes were too well situated and it was nothing compared to the lead we threw. We threw over one thousand rounds one day and part of the night with (censored) guns. There were around one hundred artillery guns so don't think Jerry didn't get plenty of lead. Most of the prisoners had fought in Russia that were captured the first week and they said they had never gone through anything like it in Russia. Took us almost two weeks to take Meteur for it was pretty rugged country and the engineers had to build roads for us to travel over. The last day (Mother's Day) we put down a barrage of artillery fire and the Tanks and T.D's. broke through and really went to town. That morning we must have travelled 15 miles and all a guy could see was German prisoners and burning vehicles. We landed in German headquarters after dinner where the German general surrendered. Found plenty of wine, war supplies and bread which was still warm, for they must have been baking that morning. All a guy could see for two days was German prisoners, and the last I heard there were better than 37,000. Had a nice talk with some of the prisoners and most of them were glad the war was over for them and wanted to stay American prisoners. Most of them would like to go to

the states and I don't blame them. It was a hard six months for us for we never had a rest and were always on the move. We are still around (censored) but expect to move out of here some time in the next few days. We expect to be able to go to town which we haven't been able to do for six months and spend the seven months wages we saved. Suppose around Wilmont the fields are green by now. The farmers here are cutting barley, oats, and wheat now. Most of them have McCormick binders and use mules and oxen for power. Most of the machinery they have here has come from the states. Most of them have tractors but haven't been able to get gas the past few years. We'll, Pete, thanks again for the paper. Say hello to the rest of the boys, and here's hoping we see each other in the U.S.A. soon.


